His ideas about rites of passage are particularly relevant when examining festivals such as Bastille Day, which celebrates national identity, and regional events that mark seasonal changes or agricultural cycles²².

In addition to the sociological and anthropological perspectives, historians have delved into the origins and evolution of specific French festivals. For instance, La Fête de la Musique, a nationwide music festival initiated in 1982, has been studied by researchers such as Gagnon (2007), who explores the government's role in shaping the festival to promote national unity and cultural pride. This study points to the idea that festivals can be both a reflection of and a catalyst for national policy, helping foster a shared sense of belonging among the populace²³.

Additionally, festivals like Mardi Gras and other pre-Lenten celebrations have been linked to Christian religious practices. These festivals were often incorporated into the Christian liturgical calendar but had origins in ancient Roman and Celtic traditions, which predate the rise of Christianity in France. Scholars such as Le Goff (1981) trace these celebrations back to the pagan roots of French festivity, highlighting the way Christianization appropriated and transformed these ancient rituals. According to Le Goff, many of these festivals underwent significant transformations, as religious institutions co-opted them to align with Christian themes of penance, purification, and renewal²⁴.

Furthermore, the role of festivals in regional identity has been explored in works like those of Cottrell and Le Moal (2001), who focus on how festivals in regions such as Brittany and Provence serve as expressions of local pride. These festivals often emphasize the preservation of regional dialects, dances, foods, and customs, which are vital to maintaining the distinctiveness of local communities within the broader national context²⁵.

While much of the existing literature emphasizes the historical and social significance of festivals, there is also a growing body of work that examines their economic impact. Festivals like Cannes, the Tour de France, and wine harvest festivals have become major
